Roger Goldberg was an Embry Riddle Aeronautical University graduate who joined ARINC in 1987. He served as FSEMC Assistant Secretary from FSEMC's beginning in 1995 and became FSEMC Executive Secretary in 1997 or 1998. Roger was a man of great energy and passion, not only in life, but in his belief that the FSEMC was one of the greatest tools the flight simulation industry has to promote safety and integrity in the aviation business. To know Roger was to know that he "lived, ate, and breathed" all things FSEMC.

Each year, ARINC Industry Activities encourages nominations for the award prior to the annual FSEMC. The inscription on the award simply states those characteristics which Roger offered to us all: Extraordinary Ideas, Outstanding Service, Endless Passion. This award recognizes the individual in the FSEMC community who, like Roger, exhibits the same characteristics of outstanding personal service and exemplifies the true heart and soul of FSEMC—an FSEMC Most Valuable Player (MVP).
